President's Message: An Investment!

This is a discussion of investments, not expenditures. My message to current and prospective IGAEA members is that membership in IGAEA is an investment, not a cost. *Approaching 2000*, the

South Carolina Commerce Department's strategic plan for economic development, states that "Knowledge is the key to prosperity in an advanced economy, because knowledge is the key to competitive advantage." That same report further states that "an advanced, knowledge-oriented economy is critically dependent on its skilled and degreed workforce." I

Are you and your graphic arts courses contributing to knowledge which will lead to a more prosperous economy? Is your performance at a level you know it should be or could be? How do your achievements compare to those of your colleagues? How do you measure achievement—with what do you compare? Is your program viable? Is your program effective? Are you making a significant personal investment in your students' learning? Are your students getting the most possible return from their investment? Is your program costeffective financially and educationally?

Evidently many graphic arts programs haven't appeared cost-effective and/or educationally effective if you look at the number of programs which have been closed or phased out over the past ten years. At the same time, many other graphic

Virginia Tech Graduate Research Assistantship

Mark Sanders recently received funding by the Graphic Arts Education and Research Foundation for a three-year project to establish/maintain a World Wide Web (WWW) Server for the Graphic Communication education and industry sectors. The **Graphic Communication Electronic Publishing Project** (GCEPP) WWW Server is expected to become the "hub" on the WWW to which graphic communication educators, students and industry personnel will turn first when seeking graphic communications information. The Project will create new educational materials and services and will maintain links on the Web to related sites worldwide.

The Graduate Research Assistant will solicit educational materials from graphic communication education and industry, prepare educational materials for the project's WWW server, and communicate with educators and industry personnel regarding materials to be put on-line.

It is preferred that the candidate have a Master's degree in Technology Education or related field, along with coursework and/ or work experience in graphic communications, teaching experience, and experience with Macintosh and WWW (HTML and related) applications. Prospective applicants who meet some, but not all preferred qualifications are encouraged to apply.

The successful candidate will pursue a graduate degree in Technology Education. Salary of approximately \$1,060/month for 12 months (\$12,731/year) for first-year doctoral students, plus two semesters of tuition waivers (\$4,122/year) totaling about \$16,850/year. The position is available May 15, 1997 or ASAP thereafter.

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IGAEA Secretary honored for her community involvement

A national honor was awarded to Wanda F. Murphy, a graphic arts educator at Hunter Huss High School. She was one of the 10,000 chosen to carry the Olympic Flame. Not once but twice. The first time was for the Olympic Games and the second was for the ParaOlympic Games. She was chosen based on her community service, volunteerism, leadership and acts of kindness.

Wanda has been employed with Gaston County Schools for almost twenty years. The last ten years she has spent in the Graphic Arts Department. When her former principal, Gary Henry, was asked how he felt he replied, "The fact that she was chosen to carry the torch doesn't surprise me. She is a very sincere, warm and caring person who has the best interest of children at heart. We were the only school in North Carolina last year to be recognized in USA Today Magazine and it was through her leadership in our graphic arts department that we were recognized."

Wanda's positive attitude and bright smile can be seen in her many contributions to her school, church, community, students, and her family. Roy Farris, her father commented, "She is caring, highly dedicated, and conscientious in everything she sets out to do. Yes, we are very proud of her."

Wanda wears many hats. She is the Graphic Arts Club advisor at Hunter Huss and incorporates community service with the club activities. She is an advisor to at-risk high school students; a member of the School Improvement Team, the Employee Relations Task Force for the Gaston County Schools, National Association

of Printers and Lithographers; named to Who's Who in teachers; certified in Non-Violent Crisis Intervention; organized and maintains a clothes closet for students needing assistance; sponsors "Coats For Kids" and "Kans For Kids" through the Salvation Army; and adopts a family for Thanksgiving and Christmas. She was nominated for Gaston County Volunteer of the Year. She is the Secretary of the IGAEA, served as Chairman of the "Project Exchange," and received a President's Award for service and dedication.

In her community and volunteer service she has organized an after school tutoring program for grades 1 - 6 at Hephzibah Presbyterian Church for students in the Tryon School Community; Cochairman of the Evangelism, Service and Outreach Committee at Hephzibah; Salvation Army volunteer; Cancer Society volunteer; "Make A Difference Day" volunteer and mentor with National Recognition; Humane Society member and volunteer for pet therapy once a month at a local rest home with her dog Mickey; Boy/Girl Scout Advisor for printing/bindery badge; and hosted three foreign exchange students.

Wanda was a devoted student at Gaston College where she maintained a 4.0 grade average until she graduated June 23 with high honors. She is a Phi Theta Kappa Society Member, was named to the Honor's List and the National and International Dean's Honor List, listed in Who's Who among students, and was chief marshal for graduation. She has written articles for *The Communicator, The Bessemer City Record* and *The Hunter*. She has had poems published in *The Muse* and *The Ripping Waters*. She is always willing to give of herself and not afraid to go the extra mile. She always puts others before herself. In her spare time, she enjoys quiet time with her family, playing with her dogs, dancing and horseback riding.

When asked how she felt about this honor, she replied, "I don't feel that I do more than anyone else for my community, students and family."
